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history has been taught through illusions in order to divide and establish power these constant illusions force the psychopathic genius to develop a stream of consciousness that evokes a maladaptive schizophrenic disposition in this schizophrenic state the psychopathic genius manifests recurring illusions that were once used to control as a means of controlling as the story progresses these illusions become so cliché that it forces the psychopathic genius to rebuke societal doctrine this epic doesn't evolve instead it shows the continual war that we all fight protagonist vs antagonist god vs satan adam vs eve rich vs poor old vs new parent vs child black vs white right vs wrong morality vs judgment society vs individual master vs slave and most pertinent to the psychopathic genius nigger vs racist step inside the lost paradise of a brave new world this book is rated pg psychopathic genius vanity is the only sanity

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life is unpredictable we are given no map at birth and yet we wade through the adventure together learning different things along the way while collecting experiences excerpts from an abstract mind is a poetry collection about the chance encounters lessons learned and ideologies acquired by author ewana hines as she plays witness from the sidelines of life she tells stories about a frightening ouija board and a caged lion that yearns to be free but she also delves into philosophy and personal battles for instance there are times in this mad life when we must run and other times when we must stand and fight ewana enumerates the importance of trying while asking questions and then answering them the book is a passionate tango between fervent beliefs and carnal flesh at times it dances past political correctness on its path toward the priceless treasure of love for self the lord and our fellow human this journey unfolds through the lenses of poetry and narrative storytelling come and see where the abstract mind will go

zealotry and academic freedom began with the author's personal experience with suppression of academic speech and obstacles to the pursuit of academic quality using his own tumultuous experience as a starting point hamilton explores how

significant efforts to create an autonomous space for academic speech within the university over the past 125 years have been thwarted hamilton charges that a fundamentalist academic left in some humanities and social science faculties views the exercise of standards of academic quality and merit based performance evaluations as tools of oppression and bigotry academic zealots ferret out and oppose hidden structures of so called oppression in our eurocentric culture any faculty member overtly supporting academic quality is thus suspected of bigotry and subject to investigations the opening portion of the book locates similarities with the religious fundamentalism of the nineteenth century in waves of zealotry in american higher education the first part covers student activism in the 1960s through the emergence of a radical academic left in the early 1990s the second part examines the meaning of academic freedom and the protection of expression that should be secured the third and final portion shows how targets of the coercive tactics of the zealots in any period of zealotry can and have been effectively rebuked and ultimately overcome neil hamilton s book will generate controversy particularly the chapters that inquire into the current wave of academic suppression hamilton warns that history instructs that it can happen here this candid look into the politics of higher education will be gripping reading for all those concerned with the future of education professors administrators students and parents there has been a growing literature on this subject but none cover the legal political aspects of political correctness with such precision

in 1960 to kill a mockingbird was published to critical acclaim to commemorate to kill a mockingbird s 50th anniversary michael j meyer has assembled a collection of new essays that celebrate this enduring work of american literature these essays approach the novel from educational legal social and thematic perspectives harper lee s only novel won the pulitzer prize and was transformed into a beloved film starring gregory peck as atticus finch an american classic that frequently appears in middle school and high school curriculums the novel has been subjected to criticism for its subject matter and language still relevant and meaningful to kill a mockingbird has nonetheless been under appreciated by many critics there are few books that address lee s novel s contribution to the american canon and still fewer that offer insights that can be used by teachers and by students these essays suggest that author harper lee deserves more credit for skillfully shaping a

masterpiece that not only addresses the problems of the 1930s but also helps its readers see the problems and prejudices the world faces today intended for high school and undergraduate usage as well as for teachers planning to use to kill a mockingbird in their classrooms this collection will be a valuable resource for all teachers of american literature

universities once believed themselves to be sacred enclaves where students and professors could debate the issues of the day and arrive at a better understanding of the human condition today sadly this ideal of the university is being quietly betrayed from within universities still set themselves apart from american society but now they do so by enforcing their own politically correct worldview through censorship double standards and a judicial system without due process faculty and students who threaten the prevailing norms may be forced to undergo thought reform in a surreptitious aboutface universities have become the enemy of a free society and the time has come to hold these institutions to account the shadow university is a stinging indictment of the covert system of justice on college campuses exposing the widespread reliance on kangaroo courts and arbitrary punishment to coerce students and faculty into conformity alan charles kors and harvey a silverplate staunch civil libertarians and active defenders of free inquiry on campus lay bare the totalitarian mindset that undergirds speech codes conduct codes and campus life bureaucracies through which a cadre of deans and counselors indoctrinate students and faculty in an ideology that favors group rights over individual rights sacrificing free speech and academic freedom to spare the sensitivities of currently favored groups from maine to california at public and private universities alike liberty and fairness are the first casualties as teachers and students find themselves in the dock presumed guilty until proven innocent and often forbidden to cross examine their accusers kors and silverplate introduce us to many of those who have firsthand

experience of the shadow university including the student at the center of the 1993 water buffalo case at the university of pennsylvania who was brought up on charges of racial harassment after calling a group of rowdy students water buffalo even though the term has no racial connotations the catholic residence adviser who was fired for refusing on grounds of religious conscience to wear a symbol of gay and lesbian causes the professor who was investigated for sexual harassment when he disagreed with campus feminists about curriculum issues the student who was punished for laughing at a statement deemed offensive to others and who was ordered to undergo sensitivity training as a result the shadow university unmask a chilling reality for parents who entrust their sons and daughters to the authority of such institutions for thinking people who recognize that vigorous debate is the only sure path to truth and for all americans who realize that when even one citizen is deprived of liberty we are all diminished

from the first appearance of the lead essay in this collection in 1969 vivian gornick established herself as one of the most respected voices in the new literature of contemporary feminism speaking always for herself always maintaining her independence while at the same time reflecting and commenting upon current feminist concerns gornick became one of the most eagerly read writers in the village voice the new york times and other periodicals with characteristic passion and a quick penetrating intelligence she dissects the culture that is at the root of female oppression this collection will stand as a permanent record of the evolution of one feminist s personal consciousness over the seven years that paralleled the renaissance of american feminism these are essays to be read and reread for years to come as both men and women begin to assimilate what we have all learned from the women s movement from publisher description

in the 1960s the mainstream protestant churches responded to an urgent need by becoming deeply involved with the national black community in its struggle for racial justice the national council of churches ncc as the principal ecumenical organization of the national protestant religious establishment initiated an active new role by establishing a commission on religion and race in 1963 focusing primarily on the efforts of the ncc this is the first study by an historian to examine the

relationship of the predominantly white mainstream protestant churches to the civil rights movement drawing on hitherto little used and unknown archival resources and extensive interviews with participants findlay documents the churches committed involvement in the march on washington in 1963 the massive lobbying effort to secure passage of the civil rights act of 1964 their powerful support of the struggle to end legal segregation in mississippi and their efforts to respond to the black manifesto and the rise of black militancy before and during 1969 findlay chronicles initial successes then growing frustration as the events of the 1960s unfolded and the national liberal coalition of which the churches were a part disintegrated while never losing sight of the central indispensable role of the african american community findlay s study for the first time makes clear the highly significant contribution made by liberal religious groups in the turbulent exciting moving and historic decade of the 1960s
